
Iron Gate's mission is to feed the hungry of Tulsa—every day. They feed people in three ways, through their soup kitchen, grocery pantry and Kids Pantry. They call those who eat at Iron Gate their "guests" because they invite them to eat there. Their philosophy is that we are all guests on this earth and guests treat one another with courtesy, kindness and respect. They strive to be a friendly, welcoming place where all are greeted with a smile—a place of comfort and wholesome food, and a temporary respite from the major problems awaiting their guests outside our gates—unemployment, poverty, health care, shelter, transportation and more.

Boy Scouting was introduced to Britain, and the world, in 1907 by Sir Robert Baden-Powell, the son of an Anglican priest. The Boy Scouts of America was incorporated by Mr. Boyce on February 8, 1910. Both the Boy Scouts of America and the Brotherhood of St Andrew were chartered by Congress and signed into law by President Teddy Roosevelt in the first decade of the 20th Century, and have had a relationship since then. The *Memorandum of Understanding* signed October 17, 2016 strengthened their relationship in this 2nd decade of the 21st Century. Many Brotherhood chapters are sponsoring Boy Scout troops.



The **Brotherhood of Saint Andrew** was first organized on St. Andrew's Day, 30 November 1883, as a prayer and Bible study group at St. James' Church in Chicago. Like it's namesake the apostle St Andrew it's mission is bring men and you nearer to Christ through prayer, study and service. The Brotherhood is the official men's of the Episcopal Church and our current Presiding Bishop Michael Curry is a longtime member and supporter of the Brotherhood. We appreciate the opportunity to raise funds for these deserving charities.
